

## **TRADITIONS**





### THE CHRISTMAS TREE

The earliest mention of the display of fir trees at the end of the year was found in an account book of the Oeuvre de Notre-Dame<sup>(1)</sup> (Strasbourg) dating back to 1492. This tradition then spread throughout Alsace, the German-speaking countries and Central Europe. The Christmas tree is a symbol of light that brightens the long winter nights. It then crossed the Atlantic to find its place at the heart of the American Christmas imagery we know today.

Originally, Christmas trees were placed in public places, usually in front of churches. They were introduced into homes in the 18th century and were initially suspended from the ceiling because they were decorated with edible treats such as biscuits, nuts and apples. According to legend, it was a shortage of apples caused by drought that inspired the Meisenthal glassmakers to create the famous blown glass baubles that can still be seen today at the Strasbourg Christmas Market.

From 1850 onwards, Christmas trees were "taken down" and placed on the floor of the house or onto a table. Since then they have remained an important symbol of Christmas in the homes of the people of Strasbourg, who continue to preserve this tradition that is now practised the world over. The Grand Sapin in Place Kléber → P.11 is perhaps the ultimate expression of this tradition and is a shining beacon of the Capital of Christmas that lights up the dark winter evenings, offering a magical backdrop for passers-by and visitors.

### THE ILLUMINATIONS

In partnership with the City of Strasbourg, the Vitrines de Strasbourg association lights up the streets of the capital every year at Christmas, adding to the festive excitement of the event.

The decorations are varied and original, and often allude to the names of the streets. squares and their respective histories. Many building facades bear witness to the importance of this tradition for the people of Strasbourg, helping to brighten up the city as it welcomes throngs of enthusiastic visitors.

The decorations and illuminations are in themselves a real spectacle to behold. As you wander from one street to the next, make sure you catch a glimpse of the intricate details in the windows, on the trees and in shop fronts. They also highlight Strasbourg's rich historical and architectural heritage, including the Grande-Île, the city's historic centre, and the Neustadt district, both of which are included on UNESCO's World Heritage List.

### **ADVENT**

Advent is a time of preparation and anticipation before the celebration of Christmas.

The Advent wreath or Àdvantskrànz is a tradition of Protestant origin invented by Johann Wichern in Hamburg in the 1830s. Wichern, the director of Raue Haus, an institution for disadvantaged children, had the idea of lighting a candle every day from 1 to 23 December to keep the children entertained.

The Advent wreath as we know it today, made from branches (fir, spruce, holly, laurel) and decorated with four candles lit in succession each Sunday before Christmas, was created in around 1860. In Alsace, the first mention of the wreath dates back to 1894, but it gained popularity during the inter-war period.

The Advent calendar is another way to mark the run-up to Christmas. Every day starting from 1 December, one of its twenty-four windows is opened. Behind each flap is a picture, a sweet or a small gift.

The first Advent calendar was printed in 1903 by Munich-based Gerhard Lang. His aim was to continue his mother's tradition of attaching twenty-four biscuits to cardboard to calm his excitement. He was also inspired by the ancient tradition of giving children a picture depicting different Christmas traditions on each day of Advent.







A delight for the eyes as well as the taste buds, **Bredle**, small biscuits cut out with a biscuit cutter before baking, are a Christmas staple. Alsatians like to **prepare them with family and friends during the Advent period before giving them to loved ones.** There are many different recipes available, ranging from **Bùtterbredle (small butter cakes) to Zìmmetsternle (cinnamon stars)**, to name but a few.

Gingerbread, another Advent delicacy, was first referred to as a Christmas gift in Strasbourg in 1412. Gingerbread, which was prized for its rare ingredients (honey and spices), was given to children on St Nicholas' Day or Christmas day from the 16<sup>th</sup> century onwards. Over time, it became popular to coat it with a glaze imitating the patterns on the moulds of the period.

A glass of mulled wine, or glühwein, is often served as an accompaniment to these sweet treats. A beverage of Germanic origin, white or red mulled wine is flavoured with citrus fruits and spices such as star anise or cinnamon.

Christmas beer dates back to the 16th century. In the autumn, breweries would empty their stocks of barley and hops to prepare for the new harvest. This surplus is used to produce a special brew for consumption at the end of the year. Christmas beer is dense, distinctive, spicy and strongly hopped. It was given to the brewery's employees and most important customers as a gift.

## **CHRISTKINDEL**

The protestant equivalent to the Catholic Sant Nicholas is the Christkindel. This young woman, dressed in white and likened to the Scandinavian Saint Lucy, showers well-behaved children with gifts on the evening of 24 December. She first appeared in the 16th century as a popular representation of the Christ Child, and in 1570 Strasbourg's Christmas Market, Christkindelsmärik, was named after her.

At the end of the 19<sup>th</sup> century, Alsatian families began to freely adopt different traditions. This is how the **Chrìstkìndel made her way into Catholic families**, before being replaced a few generations later by **Father Christmas**.



## SAINT NICHOLAS

Since the middle ages, children In Alsace, as well as in the rest of the Rhine basin, have eagerly awaited the visit of the **Nikläus** (Saint Nicholas) every **6 December.** In fact, in 4<sup>th</sup>-century Asia Minor, Saint Nicholas (thought to be the Bishop of Myra at the time) was considered to be **the patron saint of children**, and there is evidence that he has been worshipped since the 11<sup>th</sup> century.

Saint Nicholas is a much-loved figure in Lorraine, the Rhine Valley, northern France, Belgium and the Netherlands.

Even today, it is customary for children to leave their shoes outside the door, along with a few sweets for the bishop and his donkey. The next morning, the children find their shoes overflowing with chocolates, mandarins, and Mannele (brioche figures in the shape of the three children that the saint is said to have saved from the infamous butcher's salt cellar.)





### HÀNS TRÀPP

According to legend, Hàns Tràpp, also known as Hans von Trotta or von Dratt, was originally a knight brigand with a sinister reputation. At the end of the 15th century, he lived at Berwartstein Castle, now in the Palatinate, not far from Wissembourg. An evil figure who reigned terror, he was a constant source of worry for the inhabitants of northern Alsace until his death in 1503. Renamed Hàns Tràpp, in popular imagery he is associated with both the Chrìstkìndel and Saint Nicholas.

Hàns Tràpp represents **the otherworldly shadows** of **winter** and is a reminder of ancient popular beliefs.



### SANTA CLAUS

The original Saint **Niclaas**, brought to America by Dutch settlers, was the inspiration behind the American **Santa Claus.** He first appeared under his new name in the 1823 poem The Night Before Christmas, written by Clement Clarke Moore.

From the 1880s onwards, Santa Claus crossed the Atlantic once again and became intermingled with local European traditions of St Nicholas, a strange Nordic "Winter Man" and even traditional bogeymen, such as Hàns Tràpp in Alsace. The result is a curious blend of cultures.

In France, he is known as **Père Noël**, in Germanspeaking countries as Weihnachtsmann, and in Alsace as Wihnachtsmann.

The imagery of the 1900s is full of these ever-changing depictions of Father Christmas, who sometimes carried a bishop's crook, a sack full of toys or a martinet, and dressed in green, red, purple or even multicoloured outfits. In 1931, an advertising campaign by Coca-Cola transformed Father Christmas into the figure we know today, and the popularity of the traditional American Christmas made him the world's most famous gift-giver.

## CHRISTKINDELSMÄRIK

### PLACE BROGLIE

Christkindelsmärik is the Alsatian dialect name for Strasbourg's traditional Christmas Market, First held in 1570, it is one of the oldest Christmas markets in Europe and for a long time was the only one in France. After being held in various locations in the city (Cathedral forecourt, Place du Château, Place Kléber, etc.), it was in 1871 that this highlight of Strasbourg Capital of Christmas took up permanent residence in Place Broglie 1.

Pass under the famous Christkindelsmärik arch \* and soak up the charming and unique atmosphere where the scent of cinnamon mingles with the flavours of Alsace:

sauerkraut, tartes flambées and other specialities.

This is one of the best places to find decorations for your Christmas tree and table. Once you're in the square, be sure to pass by the City Hall ★ and discover an exhibition of archives about Strasbourg's Christmas Market just opposite, at the back of the stalls.

## AROUND THE CATHEDRAL

### PLACE DE LA CATHÉDRALE AND PLACE DU CHÂTEAU

In the Middle Ages,
before the arrival of the
Chrìstkìndelsmärik, a
"Klausenmärik" or St Nicholas
market was held in
Strasbourg. At the time, it
was held in the Place de la
Cathédrale 2 on or around
6 December. Stalls selling
gingerbread and other sweets
stood alongside herbalists,
saddlers, second-hand
boutiques and haberdashers.

The stalls have now spread all the way to the Place du Château , where they stand on the cobblestones in the heart of the town surrounded by magnificent Vosges pink sandstone buildings at the

foot of the Cathedral.
They can also be found just a stone's throw away in Rue des Hallebardes and Rue Gutenberg.
Here you'll find traditional Christmas goods (candles, Bredle, decorations, hot drinks...). It's the ideal place to find a souvenir of your visit to the market, either to give as a gift or to keep for yourself.







## AT THE FOOT OF THE GRAND SAPIN PLACE KLÉBER

Situated in the heart of the city, Place Kléber is an important meeting point and crossroads for the people of Strasbourg. All the key ingredients of Strasbourg Capital of Christmas can be found here: togetherness, enchantment, local craftsmanship, and a friendly

atmosphere with a dedicated

area to sit back, relax and

enjoy a tasty Alsatian dish.

The Village du Partage an also be found at the foot of the Grand Sapin★. 90 charities take it in turns to promote the values of solidarity, fraternity and humanism in the true spirit

of Christmas. Here you can make responsible purchases, donate to charity collections and take part in community events, which are described in more detail on pages 22 and 23.

Or why not head to the Aubette where you can pick up precious souvenirs from centuries past, second-hand items and hand-crafted gifts? ### THE GRAND SAPIN

Standing majestically at the heart of the square, the Grand Sapin is a key symbol of Strasbourg Capital of Christmas. Every year, the public follows its journey with bated breath from the forests of the Vosges to the centre of Strasbourg! From cutting the tree down and transporting it to placing it on the square and decorating it, everything is closely supervised to ensure that the eagerly-awaited

annual event can be announced in October. At the foot of the tree a magical décor awaits you where you can live out your winter wonderland fantasies of simply take a pretty photo.

This year's Christmas tree decoration features the emblem of the 2023 event: the heart. It is decorated with garlands of pearls, luminous candles, red baubles, kelsch hearts, wicker stars and cross-stitched snowflakes. The different decorations symbolise the warmth of the home at Christmas time, the magic of the city, and the generosity and sense of togetherness that we share at this time of year.

As in previous years, the tree and decorations have been chosen with **eco-**

responsibility in mind, using recyclable materials. What's more, a number of social economy associations and passionate craftspeople have helped make them, namely the Hélène de Coeur association, Inclusiv C'CITE and ESAT Caramentis.

 Stop by any day, on the hour between 4pm and 9pm, to discover the musical illuminations of the Grand Sapin.

The Grand Sapin is sourced from a sustainably managed forest. The Office National des Forêts works tirelessly to maintain the vitality of forests and strengthen their ability to adapt to climate change.

## THE QUAI DES DÉLICES

### TERRASSE ROHAN. PLACE DU MARCHÉ-AUX-POISSONS

Gingerbread, sweets and other Christmas treats were the focus of attention as far back as the Middle Ages at the St Nicholas market, and again from 1570 when it was replaced by the Christkindelsmärik. The Christmas Market is first and foremost a great place to do your Christmas shopping!

The Quai des Délices is ideal for lovers of gourmet food. Here you'll find all the right flavours to enjoy with friends over a delicious meal, to give as a tasty gift or even just to tide you over until the big day.

On the **terrace of Palais Rohan**  sample some fine wines from the region's

vineyards. Sweet tooths are equally well catered for and will delight in the traditional Bredle and bakery stalls.

Take the opportunity to admire the view towards the III where you'll see boats bobbing on the river and pedestrians strolling along the quayside.

Just round the corner, in the Place du Marché-aux-poissons (2), continue your culinary journey with a selection of hoppy beers and other savoury, mouthwatering dishes.





## THE CARRÉ D'OR MARKET

### PLACE DU TEMPLE NEUF

In need of inspiration for a great gift? Then look no further than the Place du Temple Neuf . This market is brimming with beautiful decorations, candles, sweets, jewellery, and sweet and savoury treats... there's something for everyone!

And if you want to take your shopping one step further, the surrounding streets are lined with famous boutiques and artisan pastrymakers, chocolate-makers, restaurateurs, bakers, cheese-makers and more. Once you've had your fill of window shopping, make sure you admire the area's magical décor.

### PLACE GRIMMEISSEN



# MARKETS AROUND STRASBOURG



Keen to explore the surrounding areas of Strasbourg? The Christmas market is a widespread tradition throughout the region and on both sides of the Rhine.

### STRASBOURG EUROMETROPOLIS: 33 TOWNS AND VILLAGES GET INTO THE FESTIVE SPIRIT

From the decoration of façades to the illumination of streets and monuments, the inhabitants of the communes around Strasbourg preserve the tradition of Christmas in Alsace.

A series of stalls in the Place de l'Église, a small market in a farmhouse, entertainment for children, forest trails... There are plenty of activities to choose from, all of which promise to take you **right to the heart of local life.**

### IN ALSACE

Christmas is also an opportunity to (re) discover the region. Colmar and its famous "Little Venice" are just 30 minutes away by train (from 23/11 to 29/12). If you're a fan of the great outdoors, Munster hosts a Christmas market "Au Coeur des Montagnes" (from 24/11 to 23/12). Another quirky experience is the 1700-style Christmas in Neuf-Brisach (8 to 10/12). There you'll find vendors and extras dressed in period costumes, traditional stalls and entertainment reminiscent of days gone by.

The list of markets and events is long: Orbey, Ungersheim, Grendelbruch, Bergheim, Saverne, Orschwiller, Haguenau, Ottmarsheim, Mulhouse, Barr, Obernai, Soufflenheim...
You may struggle to pronounce them, but you won't have any trouble enjoying them!

### **GERMANY**

Across the border, too, tradition is alive and well. In Freiburg im Breisgau, 150 artisans are on hand to welcome you as you soak up the friendly atmosphere of the old town. At the foot of the Ravenna Gorge, the tall stone viaduct illuminates the 40 stalls at the Christmas market, which is open every weekend in December. Or if you've had your fill of Christmas markets, why not head to the traditional half-timbered village of Gengenbach, where the world's largest Advent calendar awaits you?

With Christmas markets, mulled wine evenings and Advent concerts, the towns and villages of the Ortenau also offer plenty of opportunities to **enjoy the festive season**. From cutting down Christmas trees to blowing glass baubles, there's something for all the family.

## AN ECO-RESPONSIBLE CHRISTMAS

This 2023 edition of Strasbourg
Capital of Christmas implements
many of the recommendations made
by the Citizens' Jury® regarding
the eco-responsibility of the event.

## THE SORTING AND REDUCTION OF WASTE

This year for the first time, Strasbourg Capital of Christmas will provide **recycling bins for visitors**. These will be used to recycle plastic bottles and cans.

The organic waste produced by all stallholders at the Strasbourg Christmas Market will also be sorted, collected and recycled. **This initiative** is completely carbon-free as the waste is collected 4 times a week by teams travelling by cargo bike. The waste will then be converted into biogas and injected into Strasbourg's gas network.

Another new initiative is the option to bring your own containers for hot drinks or food bought at the market. Indeed, as the first rule of zero waste goes: "The best kind of waste is the waste we don't produce".



### **ENERGY EFFICIENT LIGHTING**

Strasbourg Capital of Christmas is renowned for its superb illuminations.

And so, in order to maintain our reputation whilst being energy-efficient, all lighting systems have been fitted with low-energy LEDs<sup>(2)</sup>. Like last year, Strasbourg Capital of Christmas is taking part in the joint effort to reduce energy costs by optimising the timing of its illuminations<sup>(3)</sup>.

The Vitrines de Strasbourg association, which is responsible for these illuminations, has opted to use decorations made from recycled plastic bottles. The bottles are processed by grinding and then 3D printing, thus helping to reduce greenhouse gas emissions.

For its part, the city largely re-uses its decorations from one year to the next, repairing them and using the second-hand market for the most part.

Made up of 50 people selected by drawing lots, the citizens' jury put forward recommendations for developing Strasbourg Capital of Christmas to meet today's social and environmental challenges.

## 6 TOP TIPS

### TO BE A RESPONSIBLE VISITOR



- I keep the reusable cup I was served my first drink in and reuse it throughout my time at the Market.
- When I no longer need my cup,
  I return it to a Christmas Market
  drinks vendor to collect my deposit,
  or I drop it off at one of the donation
  points provided (unless I want to
  keep it as a souvenir!).
- I sort my waste by disposing of all plastic waste and cans in their dedicated bins. They will then be reused.
- Where possible I bring my own container so I can enjoy delicious traditional dishes while reducing waste.
- To get around Strasbourg, I use public transport, cycle or walk.

### **REUSABLE CUPS**

No visit to the Christmas Market is complete without a hot drink. Just make sure it's served in a **reusable cup!** 

All stallholders at Strasbourg Capital of Christmas are stocking the same **returnable cups** decorated in the event's colours. They are very hard-wearing and can be washed and reused several times.

If you've finished with you cup (and don't want to keep it as a souvenir of this year's event!), simply return it to a Strasbourg Capital of Christmas drinks vendor in exchange for a deposit or drop it off at one of the Market's collection points. For each cup collected €1 is donated directly to charity.

The city has also launched a trial of biosourced cups. Produced from GMO-free cereals, they can be recycled through composting and biodegradation.

### **CARBON FOOTPRINT**

A carbon footprint assessment of the event will be carried out this year. This involves quantifying the direct and indirect greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions linked to the organisation and staging of the Strasbourg Capital of Christmas event.

This detailed analysis will make it possible to identify the levers to be used and, ultimately, to propose a short- and medium-term action plan to reduce these emissions.

# AN INCLUSIVE AND SUPPORTIVE CHRISTMAS

### **VILLAGE DU PARTAGE**

As always, the City of Strasbourg is supporting charities by hosting them at the foot of the Grand Sapin. This tradition is the perfect opportunity to share and listen, but also to discover different charities to maintain a sense of community as the year comes to a close.

For this year's event, almost 90 charities, spread across 14 stalls, are in attendance and will be happy to speak to you about the values they uphold on a daily basis such as helping society's most vulnerable people, social integration, support for people affected by illness or disability, humanitarian aid, international sponsorship, defending human rights and animal welfare.

The Village du Partage also features a number of not-to-be-missed initiatives, including Volunteer Day, the Mannele Solidaire and the Soupe étoilée.

The 11<sup>th</sup> edition of the Humanis collective's Soupe étoilée sees the return of four Michelinstarred chefs from Alsace who will prepare four soups with seasonal flavours and colours. Each soup purchased supports the solidarity projects established by the Humanis collective, including its integration project.

In the run-up to Christmas, Strasbourg is decked out in all its finery. Streets, houses, façades of monuments, windows and balconies sparkle with countless decorations, each more original than the last.

Every year, the Vitrines de Strasbourg association puts on impressive illuminated displays in the shopping streets of the Capital of Christmas. Here's just a small selection that is sure to put stars in your eyes!

### L'ALLÉE MAJESTUEUSE

Step through the **Gateway of Lights** into the magic of Strasbourg Capital of Christmas. Christmas baubles with surprise decorations, lined with red curtains, will guide you towards the **Grand Sapin**. And don't miss the angel musicians on rue Mercière.

### **BARREL DISPLAY**

In Rue des Tonneliers, 22 luminous, sparkling barrels are suspended as a tribute to the history of the street, where barrels delivered to the quays were rolled to the shops.

### THE "CATHEDRAL FIR"

Come and admire the brand new 10-metre tall "Cathedral Fir" in Place de la Gare.

### THE GIANT CHANDELIER

With its magical decorations, the **giant chandelier** is located on the corner of the Grand'Rue and the rue du Fossé-des-Tanneurs. Taking its inspiration from the gourmet delicacies of the shops in Grand'Rue, this monumental chandelier measures six metres across and 3.5 metres tall and has three tiers.

### **FAIRYTALE FOREST**

In Rue de la Mésange, **22 giant trees** with gold and white lights have been installed, giving the street a magical feel.

This enchanting forest continues on to Place Saint-Pierre-le-Jeune, where the **centuries-old trees** in the square are illuminated.



# GETTING AROUND STRASBOURG

### **GETTING TO THE CENTRE**

#### From the train station

The city centre is a ten-minute walk from the train station

If you want to use public transport, you can choose between:

- + Tram (A) (underground access from the train station), direction Campus d'Illkirch or Graffenstaden
- Tram D (underground access from the train station), direction Port du Rhin or Kehl Rathaus
- Tram (C) (access on the North Hall side), direction Neuhof Rodolp

The most central tram station is **Homme de Fer**. If you arrive when the market is open (11.30am-9pm), it is the only one serving the city centre.

### From the national bus station (Parc de l'Étoile)

The city centre is a **fifteenminute walk** from the bus station.

If you want to take public transport, go to the Étoile-Bourse tram station right next to the bus station, and take one of the following two trams:

- Tram (A), direction
   Parc des Sports
- Tram D, direction
   Poteries.

Both lines stop at Homme de Fer, the central station in Strasbourg's network and the only station in the city centre in operation when the Christmas Market is open (11.30am to 9pm).

### From the park-and-ride facilities

Located on the outskirts of the city, the 10 park-andride sites are the perfect solution for drivers coming to Strasbourg for the day who want to park with complete peace of mind. A single lowcost ticket entitles all users to a return trip by tram and/ or bus

## GETTING YOUR BEARINGS

To find your way around the city centre and locate all the stalls and events, grab a copy of the Strasbourg Capital of Christmas map, available from information points and many other partner venues.





### **†** BY FOOT

Walking is THE best way to explore the city! Surrounded by the River III, Strasbourg's historic city centre is entirely pedestrianised for the duration of the event. The 21 bridges leading to it are accessible to pedestrians 24 hours a day.

**During Market opening** hours (11.30am-9pm), bulky luggage is inspected at the entrances. If there's ever a bit of a wait, feel free to use the next entry point on your right or left - it's not far away!

The Market is spread across a number of squares. There's no set route to follow: iust look out for stalls that catch vour eve and feel free to wander around, letting yourself be swept away by the enchantment of Strasbourg Capital of Christmas!






Like pedestrians, cyclists can access the historic city centre via any of the bridges crossing the River III.

However, during Christmas Market opening hours (11.30am-9pm), anyone wishing to cross the market without stopping should take a detour. Pedestrians still have priority and bikes must travel at "walking pace".

Would you like to travel to the Christmas Market by bike? Take one of the preferred routes that will lead you to one of the large dedicated parking areas. This solution allows you to leave your bike nearby so that you can wander around the city with ease.

If you're just passing through Strasbourg and want to explore all the city has to offer beyond its historic centre, you can use the Strasbourg Eurometropolis bike hire service: Vélhop. This is available on a self-service, in-branch or click & collect basis.

All tram lines in the city centre are in operation. The Langstross Grand'Rue, Broglie and Alt Winmärik tram stations will not be served when Strasbourg Capital of Christmas is open, i.e. between 11.30am and 9pm. Homme de Fer station will remain open as usual, even during the Christmas Market opening hours. Bus routes that usually run through the city centre are being diverted.



### BY CAR
