# CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS

# THE CHRISTMAS TREE

For centuries, the Christmas tree has lit up our homes, symbolising light in the long winter nights. First mentioned in 1492 in Strasbourg, this tradition spread to Alsace, the Germanic countries and Central Europe, before crossing the Atlantic to become an emblem of American Christmas.

Originally, fir trees were placed in public places, especially in front of churches, before they were brought into homes in the 18th century, first hanging from the ceiling and decorated with edible foodstuffs. Legend has it that a shortage of apples inspired the glassmakers of Meisenthal to create the famous blown glass balls. Since 1850, fir trees have been enthroned on the floor or on a table, becoming a tradition that is now widespread throughout the world.

The Great Tree on Place Kléber in Strasbourg is an emblematic symbol of this tradition, providing a magical setting and lighting up winter evenings.

# THE ILLUMINATIONS

In partnership with the City of Strasbourg, the Vitrines de Strasbourg association lights up the streets of the Capital of Christmas every year, contributing to the magic of the event.

The decorations are varied, original and are often nods to the names of streets, squares, or their history. Many building facades bear witness to the attachment of the people of Strasbourg to this tradition and contribute to the warm atmosphere of the city at this time of year.

The illuminations are a real event to discover, highlighting the richness of Strasbourg's

historical and architectural heritage, including the Grande-Île with the Neustadt district, which is listed as a UNESCO World Heritage Site.

# **ADVENT**

Advent is a time of preparation and anticipation before the celebration of Christmas. The Advent wreath, or Àdvantskrànz, is a tradition of Protestant origin invented by Johann Wichern in Hamburg in the 1830s. Wichern, the director of Raue Haus. an institution for disadvantaged children, had the idea of lighting a candle every day from December 1 to 23 to keep the children entertained. The Advent wreath as we know it today—made from branches (fir, spruce, holly, laurel) and decorated with four candles. which are lit in succession each Sunday before Christmas—was created around 1860. In Alsace, the first mention of the wreath dates back to 1894, but it gained popularity during the inter-war period.

The Advent calendar counts the days of the run-up to Christmas. It was first printed in 1903 by Gerhard Lang in Munich. Every day, from 1st to 24th December, a window is opened, revealing a picture, a treat or a small gift. This tradition is inspired by an ancient practice of giving Christmas pictures to children every day of Advent.







# **SWEET TREATS**\*

Bredle, small traditional Christmas biscuits, are a must-have for the holidays in Alsace. Prepared with family or friends during the Advent period, they come in many varieties, such as Bùtterbredle (butter bredle) and Zìmmetsternle (cinnamon stars).

Gingerbread, first mentioned in Strasbourg in 1412, is another Advent delicacy. Made with honey and sought-after spices, it has been distributed to children on St. Nicholas' Day or at Christmas since the 16th century.

To accompany these sweets, it is customary to drink a good glass of mulled wine\* (Glühwein), a drink of Germanic origin enhanced with citrus fruits and spices such as star anise or cinnamon.

Christmas beer, whose tradition dates back to the 16th century, is dense, unusual, spicy and has a strong taste of hops. It was offered to employees and customers of breweries as a New Year's gift.

# A SUSTAINABLE CHRISTMAS

This 2024 edition of Strasbourg Capital of Christmas marks the continuation of the recommendations of the citizens' jury linked to the sustainability of the event.

# **ENERGY EFFICIENT LIGHTING**

Strasbourg, the Capital of Christmas, is renowned for its superb illuminations. To maintain this reputation while being energyefficient, all lighting systems have been fitted with low-energy LEDs (2). Like last year, Strasbourg, the Capital of Christmas, is taking part in a joint effort to reduce energy costs by optimizing the timing of its illuminations (3). The Vitrines de Strasbourg association, responsible for these illuminations, has chosen to use decorations made from recycled plastic bottles. The bottles are processed by grinding and then 3D printing, helping to reduce greenhouse gas emissions. For its part, the city largely reuses its decorations from one year to the next, repairing them and relying on the second-hand market whenever new items are needed.

All the decorations are made of low-consumption LEDs, which reduces the energy impact to a minimum. For example, the Cathedral Tree is made up of more than 80 cathedrals printed in Recyprint, using 14,000 recycled bottles.

For its part, the City largely reuses its decorations from one year to the next, repairs them and mainly goes through the second-hand market.

New this year is the installation of nonilluminated decorations on certain trees that adorn the Place de la Gare, such as hearts made of kelsch fabric, emblems of Alsatian heritage, accompanied by Christmas baubles.

- Made up of 50 people selected by drawing lots, the citizens' jury put forward recommendations for developing Strasbourg, the Capital of Christmas, to meet today's social and environmental challenges.

# **REUSABLE CUPS**

No visit to the Christmas Market is complete without a hot drink. Just make sure it's served in a **reusable cup!** All stallholders at Strasbourg, the Capital of Christmas, are stocking the same **returnable cups** decorated in the event's colours. These cups are very hard-wearing and can be washed and reused several times.

If you've finished with your cup (and don't want to keep it as a souvenir of this year's event!), simply return it to a Strasbourg Capital of Christmas drinks vendor in exchange for a deposit or drop it off at one of the Market's collection points. For each cup collected, €1 is donated directly to charity.

The city has also launched a trial of biosourced cups. Produced from GMO-free cereals, they can be recycled through industrial composting.





# **SORTING AND REDUCING WASTE**

This year, Strasbourg Capital of Christmas is reinforcing its waste sorting capacity. In addition to the usual sorting bins installed throughout the Christmas Market, sorting islands are to be set up in the main squares: Place Kléber, Broglie and Place du Château. The aim of them is to facilitate sorting and to further recycle all the waste produced.

Furthermore, the sorting of organic waste from exhibitors has been reinforced: it is sorted in technical areas, then collected daily, up to twice a day on weekends, and recovered as biogas injected into the Strasbourg gas network. And non-recoverable waste will be collected by the Eurometropolis of Strasbourg after the operating period. The City of Strasbourg provides exhibitors with an infrastructure to help them comply with legislation on wastewater recovery.







Don't forget to bring your own container to enjoy the delicious dishes offered by the exhibitors.

The first rule of zero waste: "the best waste is the one we don't produce". (4)

# 7 TOP TIPS

# TO BE A RESPONSIBLE VISITOR



- To get around Strasbourg, I prefer public transport, cycling and walking.
- To make the most of the Christmas atmosphere, I plan my visit according to the crowds in the city centre. The crowds are generally lower on Mondays and Tuesdays, and higher on Wednesdays and weekends.
- I participate in selective waste sorting by throwing away plastic bottles in a dedicated bin or in a sorting island. This waste will thus be recovered.
- I keep the reusable cup in which I was served my first drink and I reuse it throughout my visit to the Market.
- When I no longer need my cup, I return it to a Christmas Market exhibitor selling drinks to get my deposit back or I drop it off in one of the donation terminals provided for this purpose; unless I want to keep it as a souvenir! Donations will be given to a Strasbourg charity.
- To reduce waste production, I bring my own container to enjoy delicious traditional Christmas dishes.
- I donate items in good condition that I no longer use by going to the solidarity collection chalet located at the Village du Partage, Place Kléber.

# **CHRÌSTKÌNDELSMÄRIK**

# PLACE BROGLIE

Christkindelsmärik is the Alsatian dialect name for Strasbourg's traditional Christmas Market. First held in 1570, it is one of the oldest Christmas markets in Europe and, for a long time, was the only one in France. After being held in various locations around the city (Cathedral forecourt. Place du Château. Place Kléber, etc.), this essential part of Strasbourg, Capital of Christmas, found a permanent home in place **Broglie** 1 in 1871.

Pass under the famous

Christkindelsmärik arch \*
and soak up the charming,
unique atmosphere, where
the scent of cinnamon
mingles with the flavors
of Alsace: sauerkraut,



tartes flambées, and other specialties. This is one of the best places to find decorations for your Christmas tree and table.

Once you're in the square, be sure to pass by the City Hall \* and discover an exhibition of archives about Strasbourg's Christmas Market just opposite, at the back of the stalls.

# **AROUND** THE CATHEDRAL

# PLACE DE LA CATHÉDRALE AND PLACE DU CHÂTEAU

In the Middle Ages, before the arrival of the Christkindelsmärik, a "Klausenmärik" or St Nicholas market was held in Strasbourg. At the time, it was held in the place de la Cathédrale 2 on or around 6 December. Stalls selling gingerbread and other sweets stood alongside herbalists, saddlers, second-hand boutiques, and haberdashers.

The stalls have now spread all the way to the place du Château 3. where they stand on the cobblestones in the heart of the town, surrounded by magnificent Vosges pink sandstone buildings at the foot of the Cathedral. They

can also be found just a stone's throw away in rue des Hallebardes 4 and rue Gutenberg 6. Here you'll find traditional Christmas goods (candles, Bredle, decorations, hot drinks...). It's the ideal place to find a souvenir of your visit to the market. either to give as a gift or to keep for yourself.



# TOP TIPS SPOTTED BY LOCALS

If you're feeling energetic, why not climb the 332 steps up to the Cathedrale platform ★? From here, you'll have a breathtaking panoramic view of the city.

In the mood to be curious? The first floor of 5° Lieu★ houses a free permanent exhibition on Strasbourg's heritage, with an unbeatable view of the surrounding stalls.

# THE REGION INVITED: THE NORTHERN VOSGES REGIONAL NATIONAL PARK

Strasbourg Capital of Christmas, is showcasing the Northern Vosges Regional Nature Park, on place de la Cathédrale 2. A collective chalet is shared between producers and artisans from this region, all labelled 'Marque Valeurs Parc'. Discover a wide range of products: honey, stoneware Christmas decorations, natural wool, handmade knitwear, aromatic and medicinal plants, and natural mineral water.

## **SPIRITUALITY**

Exhibition of 14 tapestries from the 17th century illustrating the life of the Virgin Mary.

The Quai des Délices is ideal for lovers of gourmet food. Here, you'll find all the right flavors to enjoy with friends over a delicious meal, to give as a tasty gift, or even just to tide you over until the big day.

On Terrasse Rohan @. discover excellent grape varieties from the region's estates offered by the Tribu des Gourmets. Sweet palates

can indulge in traditional Bredle cookies, which are now enriched with new flavors and specialties. And let yourself be tempted by the delicious creations from the bakers of the Fédération des Boulangeries du Bas-Rhin.

Take the opportunity to admire the view towards the III, where you'll see boats bobbing on the river and pedestrians strolling along the quayside, or board a Batorama \* boat to sail through the traditions and stories of Alsatian Christmas during a chocolate cruise. Info and reservation:

There's one festive treat that no Strasbourger will ever forget: the Bredle, those little biscuits cut out with a cookie cutter before baking, whose mouth-watering aroma wafts pleasantly through every home in the run-up to Christmas.

But this sweet treat is just one of many local Christmas specialties that delight foodies of all ages.

Wherever you go, you'll come across plenty of stalls serving traditional drinks and snacks. Your taste buds are in for a treat: Strasbourg, Capital of Christmas, is opening up its kitchens to you!

# THE BAKERS AND WINEGROWERS OF QUAI DES DÉLICES

The **Quai des Délices** is a perfect place to (re)discover the sweet tastes of an Alsatian Christmas.

On site, the Fédération des Boulangeries du Bas-Rhin welcomes you to make you drool in front of all its artisanal specialties\* made in the pop-up bakery. Traditions, local products, know-how and "homemade" goods are the pillars of the profession.

After work or after having walked through the different squares of the Christmas Markets, enjoy a festive getaway at the **Tribu des Gourmets** to taste an authentic mulled wine made with white wine from Alsace\*. A friendly atmosphere is guaranteed in the traditional chalet that is fully open and decorated with barrels and wooden frames.

# MAKE YOUR OWN BREDLE

Bredle is a story of indulgence but above all of sharing. As the holidays approach, the Alsatians are keen to offer small bags wellstocked with their own biscuits.

You too, why not get started in the production of Bredle with traditional or more original recipes? You will find some inspiring collections in Strasbourg bookstores, and also in this booklet concocted by the agents of the City of Strasbourg, and accessible at noel.strasbourg.eu

And to make your Bredle, keep your eyes open, you could find not far from here a multitude of **cookie cutters** of all shapes to get you into the kitchen and dazzle your loved ones with your taste creations!



### WINSTUBS AND OTHER RESTAURANTS

In Strasbourg, the range of restaurants on offer is like its inhabitants: generous! From the traditional winstub to the 100% plant-based restaurant, including world cuisines and other revisited specialties, there is something for every palate! Don't hesitate to push open their doors to discover our Alsatian specialties.

 In Strasbourg, if you don't know how to pronounce 'Flàmmekueche' in the Alsatian style, you can just say 'tarte flambée', which means flame-grilled tart.

# AT THE FOOT OF THE GRAND SAPIN PLACE KLÉBER

Situated in the heart of the city, place Kléber is an important meeting point and crossroads for the people of Strasbourg. All the key ingredients of Strasbourg Capital of Christmas can be found here: togetherness, enchantment, local craftsmanship, and a friendly atmosphere with a dedicated area to sit back, relax, and enjoy a tasty Alsatian dish.

The Village du Partage ② can also be found at the foot of the Grand Sapin ★. Ninety charities take it in turns to promote the values of solidarity, fraternity, and humanism in the true spirit of Christmas. Here you can

make responsible purchases, donate to charity collections, and take part in community events, which are described in more detail on pages 18 and 19.

Or why not head to the Aubette the where you can pick up precious souvenirs from centuries past, second-hand items, and hand-crafted gifts? From 27 November to 8 December, Le Noël des Brocanteurs takes place. From 13 December to 22 December, OZ, le Noël des métiers d'art, takes place. These are perfect opportunities to (re)discover unique local artistry.





# THEGRANDSAPIN

Standing majestically at the heart of the square, the Grand Sapin is a key symbol of Strasbourg Capital of Christmas. Every year, the public follows its journey with bated breath from the forests of the Vosges to the centre of Strasbourg! At the foot of the tree a magical décor awaits you where you can live out your winter wonderland fantasies or simply take a pretty photo.

This year, the 'Grand Sapin' is decked out in the colours of Strasbourg, UNESCO World Book Capital 2024, to

discover traditional Christmas stories, tales and legends, while paying tribute to the art of origami and the penknife. Book pages fly away from a giant book opened and placed at its foot, releasing magic alongside white paper flowers, symbols of the fertility of the spirit and the richness of stories.

As in previous years, the tree and decorations have been chosen with ecoresponsibility in mind, using recyclable materials. The Grand Sapin is sourced from a sustainably managed forest. The Office National des Forêts works tirelessly to maintain the vitality of forests

and strengthen their ability to adapt to climate change.

In addition, several social and solidarity economy associations or passionate artisans participated in the production of them: the red balls were made by ESAT Caramentis and the wicker stars by Inclusiv CCITE.

 Stop by any day, on the hour between 4 pm and 9 pm, to discover the musical illuminations of the Grand Sapin.

As Christmas approaches, Strasbourg is decked out in its best finery. The streets, houses, facades of monuments, windows and balconies sparkle with countless decorations, each more original than the last.

The Vitrines de Strasbourg association makes increased efforts every year to illuminate the shopping streets of the Capital of Christmas with breathtaking decorations, as varied as they are original, which are often nods to the names of streets and squares or their history.

Do you want to experience a magical moment and be amazed? Discover our selection of must-see places to explore the city under the magic of Christmas.

## THE MAJESTIC ALLEY

Pass through the Porte des Lumières on Rue du Vieux-Marché-aux-Poissons to enter the magic of Strasbourg, the Capital of Christmas. Christmas baubles with surprise decorations, bordered by red curtains, will guide your steps towards the 'Grand Sapin'. Don't miss the musical angels on Rue Mercière and the Baccarat chandeliers on Rue des Hallebardes.

## THE CATHEDRAL TREE

Come and admire, on the **Place de la Gare**, the **Cathedral Tree** made up of more than 80 cathedrals and shining with a thousand lights from its height of 12 metres. This is an original creation 100% made in france by the Vitrines de Strasbourg in the workshops of the company Blachere Illumination, in Apt in Vaucluse.

## **BARREL DISPLAY**

In **Rue des Tonneliers**, 22 luminous, sparkling barrels are suspended as a tribute to the history of the street, where barrels delivered to the quays were rolled to the shops.

## THE GIANT CHANDELIER

With its magical decorations, the **giant chandelier** is located on the corner of the **Grand'Rue** and **Rue du Fossé-des-Tanneurs.** Taking its inspiration from the gourmet delicacies of the shops in Grand'Rue, this monumental chandelier measures six metres across and 3.5 metres tall and has three tiers.

### FAIRYTALE FOREST

In Rue de la Mésange, 22 giant trees with gold and white lights have been installed, giving the street a magical feel. This enchanting forest continues on to Place Saint-Pierre-le-Jeune, where the centuries-old trees in the square are illuminated.

On **Place Gutenberg**, the famous blue tree and its teddy bear pay homage to Strasbourg, the World Capital of Books! Just like the **Rue du Jeu des Enfants**, which is adorned with illuminated books.

# **GETTING TO THE CITY CENTRE**

# From the railway station

The city centre is about **ten** minutes on foot from the train station.

And from the station, by taking Rue du Maire Kuss on foot, you can take yourself directly to the Christmas Market of the Irréductible Petits Producteurs d'Alsace, to the Advent Village, Square Louise Weiss and to the OFF Market, Place Grimmeissen.

If you wish to take **public transport**, you can choose between:

- Tram A (underground access from the station), direction Campus d'Illkirch or Graffenstaden
- + Tram D (underground access from the station), direction Port du Rhin or Kehl-Rathaus
- Tram (access from the North Hall side), direction Neuhof Rodolphe Reuss

And you have the option of getting off at the Ancienne Synagogue Les Halles and Homme de Fer tram stations to access the Christmas markets.

# From the bus station (Parc de l'Étoile)

The city centre is about **fifteen minutes on foot** from the bus station.

The Christmas market around the Cathedral and the Quai des Délices are a few metres away on foot if you head towards the Place d'Austerlitz, then the Place du Corbeau and pass under the Porte des Lumières Strasbourg Capital of Christmas.

If you want to take public transport, go to the Étoile-Bourse tram station, right next to the bus station, and take one of the following two trams:

- Tram A direction
   Parc des Sports
- Tram D, direction
   Poteries.

Both lines allow you to stop at **Homme de Fer**.

### From the park and ride lots

Located on the outskirts, the park and ride lots are THE good deal for motorists who come to spend the day in Strasbourg and want to park in peace. A single ticket at a great price allows all the occupants of the vehicle to

benefit from the Strasbourg tram and bus network without any limits.

# T BY FOOT

Walking is THE best way to explore the city! Surrounded by the River III, Strasbourg's historic city centre is entirely pedestrianised for the duration of the event. The 21 bridges leading to it are accessible to pedestrians 24 hours a day.

During market opening hours (11:30 am-9 pm), bulky luggage is inspected at the entrances. If there's ever a bit of a wait, feel free to use the next entry point on your right or left—it's not far away! The market is spread across a number of squares.

There's no set route to follow: just look out for stalls that catch your eye and feel free to wander around, letting yourself be swept away by the enchantment of Strasbourg Capital of Christmas!





Like pedestrians, cyclists can access the historic city centre via any of the bridges crossing the River III.

However, during Christmas market opening hours (11:30 am–9 pm), anyone wishing to cross the market without stopping should take a detour. Pedestrians still have priority, and bikes must travel at "walking pace."

Would you like to travel to the Christmas market by bike? Take one of the preferred routes that will lead you to one of the large dedicated parking areas. This solution allows you to leave your bike nearby so that you can wander around the city with ease.

If you're just passing through Strasbourg and want to explore all the city has to offer beyond its historic centre, you can use the Strasbourg Eurometropolis bike hire service: Vélhop. This is available on a self-service, in-branch, or click & collect basis.

Parking spaces on the immediate fringes of the city centre are reserved for people with reduced mobility (PRM), medical staff, Citiz carsharing vehicles, and taxis for the duration of the event.
